

Easter Theme

Please take these guides as just that-guides. We encourage you to follow your child's lead and let them explore with the materials in the bag! Each activity has an "end product" but this doesn't mean that everyone's "end product" will be the same.

Activities are designed so some parent assistance may be needed- remember to **praise** your child while you work together!

Encourage- but don't pressure them to develop new skills (i.e. holding a crayon properly, holding scissors, cutting materials themselves), children will become more confident in new skills if we allow them the opportunity to practice them.

Remember-Communicate and engage with your child through all the activities. Doing so will keep them involved for longer, get them thinking, problem solving, and helps builds a connection with you!

Activities are grouped by age- scroll to find your age group!

Materials

Activities for Ages Birth to 12 Months

Rhyme Cards

Materials

Rhyme Cards (3)

Rhyming is a fun way to engage your baby. You can start rhyming during pregnancy and infants can recognize the familiar sounds and rhythms! Rhyming is great tool for language development, pattern recognition and memory development. Its also a great tool for you on long car rides/ diaper changes/bath times to keep baby entertained!

Easter Egg Sensory

Materials

- Sequin Egg
- Fuzzy Egg

Infants learn through all their senses throughout the day. During play time, offer these eggs to your baby by rolling them, softly running them along their body (even newborns!) while running it along their hands, feet and legs, etc. describe to them what they are experiencing. Soft, scratchy, tickly, bumpy, smooth, etc. As babies age their will start to explore these items more on their own with their mouth- keep describing what they be feeling/ experiencing!

Carrot Feet Painting

Materials

- Orange Paint
- White Paper
- Green Paper

You will need

- Paint brush
- Glue (if you don't have glue, a dab of paint will hold it on as well)

Get those cute little feet and paint them up! Some babies will love this and if your babe has tickly feet they may not like it! Don't force it, give them time to learn what this cold, wet thing is on this limb I just discovered I had is! After painting, one foot at a time, press it onto the white paper-let dry. Repeat with second foot. Once dry, cut around each foot. Using the green paper, cut out stems for your carrot and glue them on the back.



Tug Box

Materials

- Box
- Ribbon
- Pretty paper

You will need

- Glue (white or hot)
- Scissors

Decorate the box with eh pretty paper if desired. Let dry. Poke holes into the box and lid. Tie a knot on one end of the ribbon and feed it through two holes. Tie a knot on the other end. This activity is great for developing cause and effect, problem solving and fine motor.



Egg Shaker

Materials

- Easter egg (2)
- Seeds
- Small roll of tape

Fill both eggs with the bird seed (you could also use rice, beads, etc.) and tape each closed with the decorative tape including the small holes in each egg. Decorate it like an easter egg! Let baby play with it by shaking and rolling it. For young infants, shake it beside each ear and see if they try to follow with their eyes where the sound is coming from. They may make other reactions as well, smile, coo or wiggle! This is fun for tummy time too!



Activities for Ages 1 and 2 years

Bunny Bubble Wrap Painting

Materials

- Bunny template
- Paint (2)
- Bubble wrap

You will need

• Paper plate or plate to put paint on

This is a fun activity for your child to work on their fine motor development. Using different materials to paint with opens up opportunities for creativity and showcases cause and effect of materials.

Do this activity, all you need to do is spread the paint onto a paper plate and dip the bubble wrap into the paint then stamp it onto your bunny! Try mixing colours over top of each other. You can leave the bunny as is or cut it out.

Tennis Ball Squeeze

Materials

- Tennis ball
- Carrots (5)

You will need

- Knife or scissors for cutting.
- Sharpie (optional)

Cut a slit into the tennis ball. Try squeezing it so see if it's a good size opening). Add on some bunny ears or face with sharpie if desired! Place the carrots out and demonstrate how to squeeze the ball. Guide your child to the carrots and see if they can pick up the carrots with their ball. Children are developing their fine motor skills though the activity along with concentration/focus and counting (math) development! Keep adding carrots or taking carrots away to get your child to recount and keep them engaged. For added difficulty, you can put the carrots in different places around your house so the child can search and practice picking them up from different surfaces and heights (high chair, or low on the floor).



Easter Egg Lacing

Materials

- Egg template
- Yarn

You will need

Hole punch or scissors

Break out the scissors/hole punch and poke a few holes along the side or throughout the egg (be creative!). Tie a large knot on one end of the yarn and show your child how to weave the year through to a hole then pull, then to another hole. Remember the end product on this is not the goal, it's the experience). Finish each yarn by tying another large knot on the end.



Egg Planters

Materials

- Plastic Eggs (2)
- Soil
- Seeds (wild flower)

You will need

- Water
- Hot glue

Spring is here!! Let's get ready by planting some wildflowers- these help the bees, and the bees help us! All you need to do is; hot glue the eggs together as shown in the picture below. After the glue is dried, fill the egg halfway with soil, sprinkle seeds across the soil then fill the remainder of the egg with soil. Water and place in a sunny or partially shaded area.

Tiger (Bunny) Tail

Materials

- Direction sheet
- Fabric scrap

Check out the info sheet for all the directions. its important to keep children moving. Not only to expel energy (which helps them sleep better) but to keep their minds developing, to ensure they are healthy and to give them the tools to learn how to keep themselves healthy throughout their life.

Activities for Ages 3 and 4 years

Bunny Bubble Wrap Painting

Materials

- Bunny template
- Paint (2)
- Bubble wrap

You will need

Paper plate or plate to put paint on

This is a fun activity for your child to work on their fine motor development. Using different materials to paint with opens up opportunities for creativity and showcases cause and effect of materials.

Do this activity, all you need to do is spread the paint onto a paper plate and dip the bubble wrap into the paint then stamp it onto your bunny! Try mixing colours over top of each other. See if you can make a pattern. You can leave the bunny as is or cut it out.

Materials

- Balloon
- String

You will need

Tape

For added Easter fun, turn your balloon into an easter egg by drawing patterns on it! Materials

- Paper cup (2)
- Yellow paper
- Pink paper
- Eyes (2)
- Rubber band
- Cotton Ball

Chick Painting

Materials

- Wooden board
- Eyes (2)
- Yellow paint
- ¼ orange paper

You will need

Fork

All you need to do is dip your fork into the paint (you may need to lay it onto a paper plate or small cup) and drag the fork in different directions. Oce dry, glue on the eyes and cut out a beak and legs and you have a little chick! This activity is so easy to recreate and adapt to many different pictures!
